Visiting Students

Whether you're seeking to take a deep dive into an area of interest or incorporate a cross-disciplinary perspective into your studies, the Visiting Students program offers students enrolled in a degree program at another institution the specialized<u>https://sps.columbia.edu/</u>, world-class instruction that you would expect in the Ivy League. Visiting students are enrolled alongside matriculated Columbia degree students, and earn credits that may be used towards graduation at your home institution.

As a student in the Visiting Student Program you will work with an advisor to create a customized schedule to reflect your individual academic and career goals from a selection of the 3,000+ University undergraduate and graduate courses available to you. If you are looking for a more structured curriculum you may apply to one of our structured programs open to visiting students. All visiting students have access to Columbia resources, including the libraries, writing center, academic advisors, fitness center, and student services. Learn more here.

Visiting students may enroll during the fall, spring, and summer semesters. Students interested in studying in the summer may do so for either six or 12 weeks and should <u>visit our summer website for program options</u>.

Undergraduate Visiting Student Program

Columbia University provides excellent options for strengthening an application and developing skills, as well as receiving graduate school application advising and support. As a Visiting Student, you will learn from respected faculty instructing an extensive range of courses only available at Columbia and gain an experience that demonstrates your potential as a scholar.

Students enrolled in an undergraduate degree program at another university and in good academic standing may apply to the Undergraduate Visiting Students Program.

Credits Transfer

Length of Study

Admission as an Undergraduate Visiting Student is permitted for a maximum of two terms plus the Summer sessions. Continuation into the second term is contingent on successful completion of the first.

University Courses

Details on Course Seats and Required Preparation

Course information is found in the <u>Columbia University Directory of Classes</u>.

Admittance into the Visiting Student program does not guarantee any student a seat in a course. Certain courses such as seminars are not normally open to visiting students unless express permission is granted in advance by the instructor, department or program. Permission to register for courses in other divisions of the University depends on the course, the school that offers it, and the student's academic status within the School of Professional Studies. Some schools allow cross-registration; others do not. <u>Specific cross-</u> <u>registration information for each school can be found here</u>.

Please check with individual instructors about specific prerequisite course requirements. Admitted students may register for courses only if any course for which they are prepared—i.e., any noted prerequisites must be fulfilled.

A number of classes are offered after 5:00 PM, for those students who work during the day.

In over-enrolled courses, Columbia degree candidates often have priority over non-degree students.

Graduate Visiting Student Program Length of Study

Admission as a Graduate Visiting Student is permitted for a maximum of two terms plus the Summer sessions. Continuation into the second term is contingent on successful completion of the first.

During the Fall (September–December) and Spring (January–May) terms, visiting students may choose from more than 3,000 academic courses in more than 100 subject areas. One semester runs about 14 weeks. Students on an F-1 visa are required to take at least 12 credits (about 4 courses).

There are two summer sessions between May and August; each session runs for 6 weeks. Students may attend one or both sessions. During the summer, Columbia offers more than 250 courses in more than 50 subject areas. Students on an F-1 visa are required to take 6 credits (about 2 courses) per 6week session.

Tuition & Fees

For Undergraduate and Graduate Visiting Students

The number of points a course is worth is listed next to the course title on the course listings or in the course details in the <u>Directory of Classes</u>. Many of our courses are worth 3 points each, although the precise point total varies.

Tuition and fees may be subject to change and approval by the Board of Trustees.

Fees

This listing is intended to summarize possible charges that could be incurred against a student's account. Certain charges depend upon specific circumstances, as noted. Fees that are not billed to the student account, such as course fees or placement test fees, may be required but are not listed here.

Application Fee

\$80.00 non-refundable application fee (U.S. currency). Fee payment must accompany the online application.

SPS Student Activity Fee

University Services and Support Fee, Morningside Campus

(formerly Facilities Fee)

All students registered on the Morningside Campus shall be charged a University Services and Support Fee, calculated based on the student's registration. Full-time students are those registered for 12 or more points in the term. Part-time students are those registered for fewer than 12 points (credits) in the term. This fee is not assessed to American Language Program students or School of Professional Studies Summer Program for High School students. This fee combines the Recreational Facilities Fee and Lerner Fee (for both of these, applies to Spring Term only for Academic Year 20-21), Information Technology Fee (all students charged, including part-time), and the Cross-Cutting Multi-School Activities Fee. This fee is subject to Board of Trustee approval and may change.

Technology Fee

The Student Activity fee is assessed to all degree and non-degree students as approved by the Board of Trustees, to support in-person and online student-facing services and events including but not limited to: Orientation, Graduation, Academic Support, Career Services, Student Engagement Platforms, and is used to fund SPS student organizations. Document Fee

The document fee entitles students to e-transcripts, enrollment and degree certifications, and the mailing of the original diploma. The fee is assessed once during the student's tenure, normally at the point of first matriculation, with students who previously attended Columbia not being billed.

Consequently, students are required to activate their Columbia email accounts immediately after confirmation of registration.

Withdrawal & Tuition Refund

Students who drop every course for which they are registered in any given term are withdrawing from the University.

Students who plan to withdraw from the University should carefully read all of the information below concerning financial considerations, the withdrawal procedure, and tuition refunds.

American Language Program students must refer to the withdrawal and tuition refund details on the ALP site.

Financial Considerations

Withdrawal Fee

All students who drop their entire academic program will be charged a \$75.00 withdrawal fee, regardless of when the withdrawal takes place.

Tuition Refunds

Tuition for courses dropped during the Change of Program period is refunded in full. After the last day of the Change of Program period, the University retains a percentage of the remaining tuition (as indicated in the withdrawal schedules below) for each week, or part of a week, that the student remains registered. Bear in mind that after the last day of the Change of Program period, refunds are granted only when students withdraw by dropping all of their courses. See the <u>Calendar</u> for the Change of Program periods for each term.

Any adjustment of the tuition that the student has paid or still owes is reckoned from the date on which the Office of Student Affairs, 203 Lewisohn, receives the student's written notification (see How to Withdraw, below). Failure to attend classes or notification submitted only to instructors does not constitute formal withdrawal (see UW, Unofficial Withdrawal, under Grades).

Fee Refunds

Fees such as the student activities fee, University facilities fee, course fees, and late fees are not refundable if the withdrawal takes place after the Change of Program period. If the withdrawal takes place before or during the Change of Program period, these fees are refunded in full. The one-time document fee, application fee, and the Columbia Health Fee are not refundable.

Student Health Insurance

Students who withdraw from the University (except for approved Medical Leaves of Absence), or are dismissed from the University, are ineligible to remain on the Student Health Insurance Plan. Refer to the <u>Eligibility page on</u> <u>the Insurance Office's website</u> for specific details and contact the Insurance Office with questions.

Federal Financial Aid Recipients

Students who receive federal financial aid are advised to contact the <u>Office of</u> <u>Student Financial Planning</u> with questions regarding financial aid eligibility and how a withdrawal may impact their aid.

International Students

Students who have F1 or J1 visa status must maintain their status, which

includes full-time enrollment in their program of study. Refer to the <u>International Students & Scholars Office (ISSO) website</u> for specific details and contact ISSO with questions.

Military & Veteran Benefits

Students who receive military & veteran tuition benefits are advised to contact the <u>Office of Military and Veterans Affairs</u> with questions regarding how a withdrawal may affect eligibility for benefits.

Special Note for GSAS Students Taking Summer Term Courses

Students in the Graduate School of Arts and Sciences who are recipients of Columbia University fellowships are advised that if they drop any Summer Term course or withdraw from a session, fellowship funds covering the tuition for that course or courses will be canceled, and the student will be responsible for payment of tuition charges incurred, as indicated in the schedules below.

How to Withdraw

A student in good academic standing who is not subject to disciplinary action may be permitted to withdraw at any time during the term up until the last day of classes (see <u>Calendar</u>), by doing the following:

- Consult with the appropriate dean of students or class dean. A student on academic probation who does not consult with his or her dean of students or class dean before withdrawing may be subject to expulsion.
- 2. Fill out a <u>Notice of Withdrawal</u> form.
- 3. Receive confirmation email from <u>sps-studentwithdrawals@columbia.edu</u>.

Students under 18 years of age must submit written consent from a parent or guardian to the Office of Student Affairs with the Notice of Withdrawal form.

Students who intend to withdraw permanently from a specific program must submit written notice of their intentions along with the Notice of Withdrawal.

Withdrawal Statement on Transcript

A withdrawal statement is added to the academic transcript for each term a student withdraws from the University.

Applying for a Tuition Refund

If the withdrawing student is entitled to a refund, the refund will be issued automatically for all School of Professional Studies programs except American Language Program and Auditors/Lifelong Learners. For those who will receive an automatic refund and do not have direct deposit set up, the student may log into <u>Student Services Online (SSOL)</u> to see where the refund check will be mailed.

Students in the ALP or Auditing programs should log into SSOL to request a refund after the withdrawal has been processed. There must be an actual credit balance (not an anticipated credit) on the account in order for a refund to be processed. The option to request a refund will not appear if there is not an actual credit on the account. Each refund application is analyzed to determine eligibility.

Refunds sent through direct deposit will usually arrive in 3–5 business days. If you do not have a U.S. bank account or you prefer to receive a paper check, your refund will be mailed in 7–10 business days to the local address listed in your student profile in SSOL.

Federal Loans

To be considered for federal loans, you must be a citizen or permanent resident of the U.S. and plan to enroll on at least a half-time basis (a minimum of 6 credits each term) in program-related coursework. This coursework must span the entire length of the semester. Other requirements apply for loan eligibility. If you are not a U.S. citizen or permanent resident, you may apply for private/alternate educational loans or find outside funding sources.
